

Minnesota Concurrent Enrollment Academic Year 2009-10

The data below is from a series of reports generated by the Minnesota Department of Education and includes information about public school students who participated in Minnesota concurrent enrollment programs. The overwhelming majority of these students enrolled in a concurrent enrollment program in which college/university courses are

- taught in the high school,
- during the regular school day,
- by specially selected and trained high school teachers.

A small number of students participated in programs that sent college faculty out to the high schools to teach the postsecondary courses.

Concurrent enrollment impacts thousands of students in Minnesota:

- **20,790:** students participating in concurrent enrollment courses (unduplicated count)
- **48,290:** course registrations
- **158,000:** college credits earned
- **85%:** MN traditional (resident) school districts with high schools offering concurrent enrollment to their students
- **\$7,243,500:** total amount of state concurrent enrollment aid if schools had rec'd \$150/registration reimbursement provided for in Minnesota statute 124D.091:
- **\$2,000,000:** total amount of state concurrent enrollment aid available to schools (an approximate proportion of 27.5%)
- **8096:** number of 11th graders participating (39%)
- **12,694:** number of 12th graders participating (61%)
- **8720:** number of males (42%)
- **12,070:** number of females: (58%)
- **31:** number of concurrent enrollment programs working with public schools (seven of these programs are NACEP-accredited)
